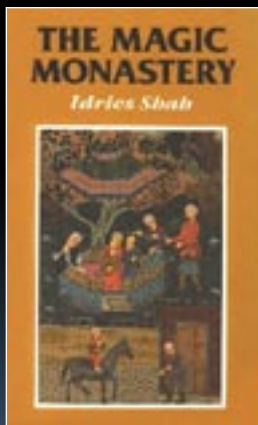
The Nature of Religious Man

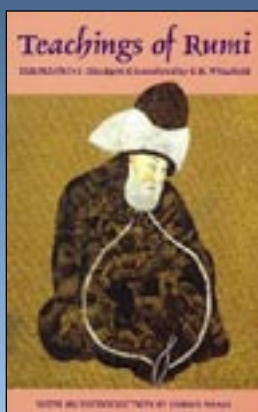


The Magic Monastery
